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



Readings activities are structure into three parts. In the pre-reading activity, students practice vocabulary and expressions useful to fully understand the reading.

In the reading activity students approach the main material. The material for the reading activities has a different format every unit, spanning from advertisement, to blog, to flyers to short narratives, providing the students to approach the language used in different contexts.

After each reading, the students can check their understanding of the content through True/False styles quizzes and open ended questions

A follow-up reading activity provides the opportunity to expand the communicative settings, by using the content learned in either a written or an oral activity.




A K-culture corner introduces the students to an aspect of contemporary Korean culture and society mentioned in the unit.


